HERE AND THERE

Wappapello Lake . . .

Old Man Winter didn't wait for Fall to end at Wappapello Lake. Starting 19 December, the lake region received several snow, ice, and freezing rain storms paralyzing movement on secondary roads and forcing all boat ramps to be closed.

As of 28 December, the Wappapello Lake level was 20.25 feet above winter pool (375.0 NGVD) and slowly falling. The lake is now almost totally frozen over.

On 19 December, Mike McClendon, Park Manager at Wappapello Lake, returned to the lake after a three month assignment in the Chief of Engineers Office in Washington, D.C. Mike was working in the Land Management Section of the Natural Resource Management Branch. Welcome back Mike!

The Annual Wappapello Lake Christmas tree collection drive is underway. Several businesses in area towns are providing collection points, trucks, and labor to transport the trees to the lake where they will be tied into bundles and deposited in various locations in the lake to serve as fish shelters. These natural shelters provide protective cover for small fish and improve food sources for larger fish.

Lake Shelbyville . . .

The new visitor's center exhibits have arrived at Lake Shelbyville. Employees from Visual Communications Incorporated spent a week setting up displays. The new exhibits will be completed by the time the Visitor Center opens for the 1984 season in March.

Congress recently passed Public Law 98-63 which authorizes the Corps of Engineers to accept volunteer labor. The St. Louis District's first volunteer is Margaret Yates. She'll be helping out with the recreation and interpretive programs at Lake Shelbyville. Thanks, Margaret, and welcome aboard!

Rend Lake . . .

The December hunting at Rend Lake has been the object of many special columns in a local metropolitan newspaper. One of these is the yearly deer hunt.

The 4th Annual Deer Hunt for the Handicapped has come to a close and after the smoke had cleared and the

smell of Buck Scent had faded away, a record number of deer were taken at Rend Lake this year. Four deer were killed in the first season (November 18-20) and three the second season (December 9-11). During the second season, Fred Powell and Jack Long both dropped does while Fred Turpin and his muzzle-loader took home a button buck.

Volunteers from the local communities as well as Southern Illinois University aided our own planners in conducting a smooth, successful hunt. Many hunters expressed an enthusiastic desire to return next year for another chance at a white-tail.

The controlled hunt for quail and rabbit is already underway. This year's season runs for six days and covers North and South Sandusky, North and South Marcum and the Gun Creek Area. Approximately 250 applications were received for the special hunts. During the first days of each hunt, 17 hunters brought in 22 quail and recorded 149 sightings while 11 rabbit hunters brought in 8 rabbits and sighted 16.

On December 12th, Park Technician Ray Zoanetti found a nutria on the main dam. The nutria, a close relative of the muskrat, was examined by the Cooperative Wildlife Research Laboratory, who reported that its discovery in this area was quite unique. The former, most northern report was considerably south of the Rend Lake area and according to the Illinois furbearer biologist, this is the first reported occurrence ever in Illinois. The specimen was donated to the Southern Illinois University Department of Zoology for further study.

Congratulations to the new 1983 District Queen, Ms. Brenda Kondritz. We here at Rend Lake are proud of Brenda and wish her a most enjoyable reign as queen. Brenda would like to thank all those who supported her.

The SLD Suggestion Campaign FY84 was conducted from 1 Nov 83 through 12 Dec 83.

Our goal was 125 suggestions; we received 136 during the campaign. IAS would like to congratulate the District for a job well done.

NEW WORK YEAR HOURS

The federal work year will be 2,087 hours instead of 2,080 hours for at least the next two years. This reduces the pay of federal white-collar employees an average of \$3 in their biweekly paychecks and saves the government (and costs the employees) \$120 million a year.

According to the General Accounting Office, the 2,080 hour work year is based on a 260 day work year even though some years contain 261 or 262 workdays.

The new system will be in effect for two years with the old 2,080 hour formula being restored in 1985 unless Congress makes the 2,087 formula permanent.

SCRAP LUMBER: IT'S EASY ON BUDGET BUT UNHEALTHY

At first the doctors thought the Wisconsin man was being done in by his wife. But when poison turned up in the rest of the family, they cast a wider net.

And what they found out about the eight-member Wisconsin household may be true of uncounted others: Using scrap lumber to fuel a woodburning stove may be easy on the budget but murder on the body. It can lead to arsenic, copper and chromium poisoning.

For three years, the Wisconsin man, his wife and their six kids suffered a range of unexplained ills: muscle

cramps, diarrhea, headaches, earaches, respiratory problems, bronchitis. Gradually, over the winter, the children would go bald. In summer, the hair would grow back. Eventually, they started blacking out.

A prominent physician, professor of neurology at the University of Wisconsin, studied household air samples and family blood and urine specimens for a variety of toxins. Nothing!

Ill, and partly bald, the father was hospitalized. Because arsenic can cause hair loss, and with other clues exhausted, the physician analyzed a hair sample for the poison. Finding: levels 130 times normal. The doctor suspected foul play, he told a recent meeting of the American Academy of Neurology, until hair and fingernail samples from the wife and six youngsters (105 to 300 parts arsenic per million, compared with a normal 0.9 to 1.8 ppm) pointed to a common source.

Back to the house for testing. The dust was loaded with arsenic, as were the clothes even after washing.

The family, it turned out, had been burning piles of scrap plywood and lumber in the kitchen stove for several years. The father, a construction worker, got it free from work sites.

But lumber for outdoor use, the physician explains, is often treated with a preservative, chromate copper arsenate. There's no danger until the treated wood is burned. The resulting smoke, fumes and ashes are loaded with arsenic plus chromium and copper. The combination is particularly dangerous.

"The number of people using wood stoves is going up," says the physician, and CCA-treated lumber is everywhere. "Look at the outdoor decks going up."

The poisoned family has switched to other fuel, he reports, but it will be years before their arsenic levels are normal.

IMPORTANT SAFETY NOTICE CONCERNING PROPANE (BOTTLED) GAS WATER HEATER THERMOSTATS

The White-Rodgers Division of Emerson Electric Co. in cooperation with the Consumer Product Safety Commission, is voluntarily recalling certain propane gas water heater thermostats manufactured by the company from 1961 to mid 1980. Thermostats manufactured between 1964 and 1976 may pose a potential risk of explosion and serious injury. **NOTE: ONLY WATER HEATERS THAT USE PROPANE GAS ARE INVOLVED.**

The replacement thermostats will include the latest safety features.

1964-1976 water heater thermostats can pose an explosion hazard if, during the life of the product, the pilot gas control knob—that is the knob marked "OFF," "PILOT" and "ON" which is located on top of the thermostat—becomes damaged so that the safety valve sticks in the open position, allowing L.P. gas to escape.


Thermostats manufactured between 1961 and 1976 are on various A.O. Smith and Sears, Roebuck and Co. L.P. gas water heaters. Thermostats manufactured after 1976 are on A.O. Smith, Sears, Roebuck and Co., State Industries, Rheem and W.L. Jackson water heaters. Some of these water heaters are labeled under private brands which are listed on the reverse side. The 1961-64 and post-1976 thermostats do not contain the pilot gas control knobs present in the thermostats that have been involved in explosions. They are being replaced with the latest model White-Rodgers thermostats because this thermostat provides increased protection for L.P. gas water heater users.


LOCATION OF PART NUMBER AS VIEWED FROM SIDE OF THERMOSTAT




