### REQUEST FOR PUBLIC COMMENT REGARDING THE PROPOSAL TO PERFORM INTERIM REMEDIAL ACTIONS IN HAZELWOOD AND BERKELEY, MISSOURI

The Department of Energy is seeking public comment on a proposal to implement limited cleanup actions for radiologically contaminated soils in the communities of Hazelwood and Berkeley, Missouri.

Our basic proposal is to complete select cleanup activities before a decision is reached on how to comprehensively clean up all of the contaminated properties located in Hazelwood and Berkeley. This proposal is a relatively small but significant component of DOE's longer term effort to implement a comprehensive remedy for all of the contaminated soils located in these communities. This comprehensive decision is not expected before 1995, with comprehensive cleanup measures probably beginning in 1996. In the meantime, DOE would like to accelerate cleanup of the small number of residential properties located in the immediate area. In addition, we would like to clean up properties where development or infrastructure maintenance activities are likely to disturb or spread contamination. Soils excavated from these properties would be transported to the existing Latty Avenue storage site for safekeeping until final cleanup measures for all sites, including the Latty Avenue site, are implemented.




I'd like to stress a few points about this proposal. First it would be conducted in a manner that is fully protective of human health and the environment. Secondly, it is not a "step" towards converting the Latty Avenue site into a permanent disposal site for the St. Louis area cleanup project. As a point of reference, cleanup of all residential properties would generate no more than 3,000 cubic yards of soil requiring storage. For planning purposes DOE has estimated that approximately 5,000 cubic yards per year could be generated by interim cleanup measures. These volumes are relatively minor when compared to the 1 million cubic yards of contaminated soils known to exist in the St. Louis area. The total remaining storage capacity available at the Latty Avenue site is approximately 70,000 cubic yards. Finally, the Latty Avenue storage site would only be used to store soils from the immediate Hazelwood/Berkeley area.

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

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
