Timothy Flint, the Congregationalist clergyman and writer, in his agricultural possibilities of Missouri, described the Cold Water Creek Valley around 1836 for the benefit of Eastern readers saying, "The soil is fertile to a degree, being a rich, heavy loam ofinky blackness."

That along with a description of Cold Water Creek around that time as a "considerable stream of pure water, and on the opposite side is one of the most fertile and valuable prairies in the Country" tells us that the best soil available should be used to replace the contaminated soil that is removed from the Cold Water Creek Valley - also known as the "Florissant Valley of Flowers."

It is a coincidence that this meeting falls on St. Patrick's Day and it isn't always easy being green as we all know from SLAPS and HISS. But perhaps when these sites are cleaned up we can have the greenway oasis so many people have dreamed about on Cold Water Creek for years. ~~_____~~

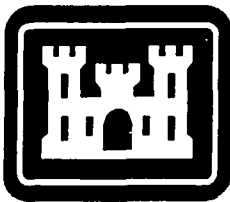
