




Mussels "The Livers of the River"

- ~69 found in Missouri
 - ~50 species found in the Upper Mississippi River
- Some species have been documented to be 100+ years old
- Natural biological filters obtaining their food from the water
- Benthic and generally sedentary
- Most need natural flow and temperatures
- Almost all require fish hosts
- Bioindicator of water quality





Mussel locomotion and burrowing



Freshwater mussel life cycle

Host fish grows parasitic mussel larvae in its gills for several weeks while they mature.

Specific fish host attacks female mussel lure and the female releases glochidia.


> Fertilized females display a portion of their mantle as a lure to attract host fish

The glochidia fall out of host fish's gills as tiny mussels when they're ready. If they land in the right spot, they may live.

Upon reaching sexual maturity, adult-male mussels release sperm into the water where females intake the sperm and are fertilized.











