MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD

SUBJECT: US Army Corps of Engineers (Corps) Pre-2015 Regulatory Regime Approved Jurisdictional Determination in Light of *Sackett v. EPA*, 143 S. Ct. 1322 (2023),¹ (MVS-2024-00655 MFR 1 of 1)²

BACKGROUND. An Approved Jurisdictional Determination (AJD) is a Corps document stating the presence or absence of waters of the United States on a parcel or a written statement and map identifying the limits of waters of the United States on a parcel. AJDs are clearly designated appealable actions and will include a basis of JD with the document.³ AJDs are case-specific and are typically made in response to a request. AJDs are valid for a period of five years unless new information warrants revision of the determination before the expiration date or a District Engineer has identified, after public notice and comment, that specific geographic areas with rapidly changing environmental conditions merit re-verification on a more frequent basis.⁴ For the purposes of this AJD, we have relied on section 10 of the Rivers and Harbors Act of 1899 (RHA),⁵ the Clean Water Act (CWA) implementing regulations published by the Department of the Army in 1986 and amended in 1993 (references 2.a. and 2.b. respectively), the 2008 Rapanos-Carabell guidance (reference 2.c.), and other applicable guidance, relevant case law and longstanding practice, (collectively the pre-2015 regulatory regime), and the Sackett decision (reference 2.d.) in evaluating jurisdiction.

This Memorandum for Record (MFR) constitutes the basis of jurisdiction for a Corps AJD as defined in 33 CFR §331.2. The features addressed in this AJD were evaluated consistent with the definition of "waters of the United States" found in the pre-2015 regulatory regime and consistent with the Supreme Court's decision in *Sackett*. This AJD did not rely on the 2023 "Revised Definition of 'Waters of the United States," as

- 3. REVIEW AREA. The JD review area is located in within two unnamed tributaries of Cadet Creek in Section 27, Township 38 North, Range 3 East, Cadet, Washington County, Missouri [Latitude: 37.9880, Longitude: -90.6879].

The JD review area is approximately 1.0-acre for the north stream and 0.75-acre for the south stream. (see attached map).

- 4. NEAREST TRADITIONAL NAVIGABLE WATER (TNW), INTERSTATE WATER, OR THE TERRITORIAL SEAS TO WHICH THE AQUATIC RESOURCE IS CONNECTED. The Meramec River is the closest downstream TNW to the waters listed above in Section 1.a. The Meramec River has been determined to be a TNW from its confluence with the Mississippi River until it reaches the border of Franklin and St. Louis County, Missouri.
- FLOWPATH FROM THE SUBJECT AQUATIC RESOURCES TO A TNW, INTERSTATE WATER, OR THE TERRITORIAL SEAS These unnamed 1st order tributaries flow directly into Cadet Creek, Cadet Creek flows approximately 1.40

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miles before reaching Mill Creek, which flows approximately 5.30 miles before reaching the Big River, which flows approximately 65 miles before reaching the Meramec River (TNW).

non-relatively permanent waters; non-tidal wetlands that do not have a continuous surface connection to a jurisdictional water).

The unnamed channels within the review areas do not provide sufficient flow durations to constitute sustained relatively permanent flows. The channels exhibit ephemeral flows only in direct response to precipitation runoff. A review of multiple years of aerial imagery available on Google Earth Pro (1996-2024) with comparable analysis utilizing the Antecedent Precipitation Tool (APT) confirms that the streams have an ephemeral flow regime. The analysis showed that both channels showed no signs of water within the channels. Based on the rainfall data collected from the APT, the drainage area size, the location within the landscape and proximity within the overall watershed, these unnamed tributaries of Cadet Creek have been determined to have non-relatively permanent flows and as such is not jurisdictional.

The unnamed ephemeral channels of Cadet Creek are not a paragraph (a)(1) TNW, is not a paragraph (a)(2) interstate waters (i.e., does not cross or serve as a state boundary), are not a lake or pond and is therefore not a paragraph (a)(3) waters (i.e., lakes or ponds that support a link to interstate or foreign commerce because they are known to be used by interstate or foreign travelers), are not a paragraph (a)(4) impoundment of a water of the U.S., are not a paragraph (a)(5) tributary due to the non-relatively permanent flows, are not paragraph (a)(6) territorial seas, and are not paragraph (a)(7) adjacent wetlands.
